Notes

The meeting between Senator Johnson and Prime Minister McMillan was arranged by Senator Fulbright and the Foreign Relations Committee with the British Embassy. It was set for 12:45 pm because the Foreign Relations Committee was having a lunch at 1:00 for the Prime Minister and had to be at the Capitol for this.

Senator Johnson invited the Prime Minister to come in the back door to his office, having gone out in the hall to meet him as he came off the elevator. Senator Johnson was extremely genial and gracious, smiling all during the visit.

Among the questions he asked the Prime Minister were what could be done to strengthen NATO and also foreign aid programs.

Senator Johnson requested that Senator Fulbright be called in Foreign Relations Committee and invited to join him. When Senator Fulbright came in, the conversation for a few minutes became lighter. The Prime Minister talked about his grandchildren and his family and Senator Johnson mentioned his own daughters.

One interesting and amusing story Mr. McMillan told had to do with something he said to Mr. Khrushchev. He told Mr. Khrushchev that they really ought to have free elections in Russia because he was such a good orator he would win easily anyway. Mr. McMillan became very animated and his face took on a surprised expression as he imitated the expression of Mr. Khrushchev. Mr. Khrushchev said, "Do you really think so?"

Afterwards when asked what his impression of Mr. McMillan was Senator Johnson said, "I liked him."
