
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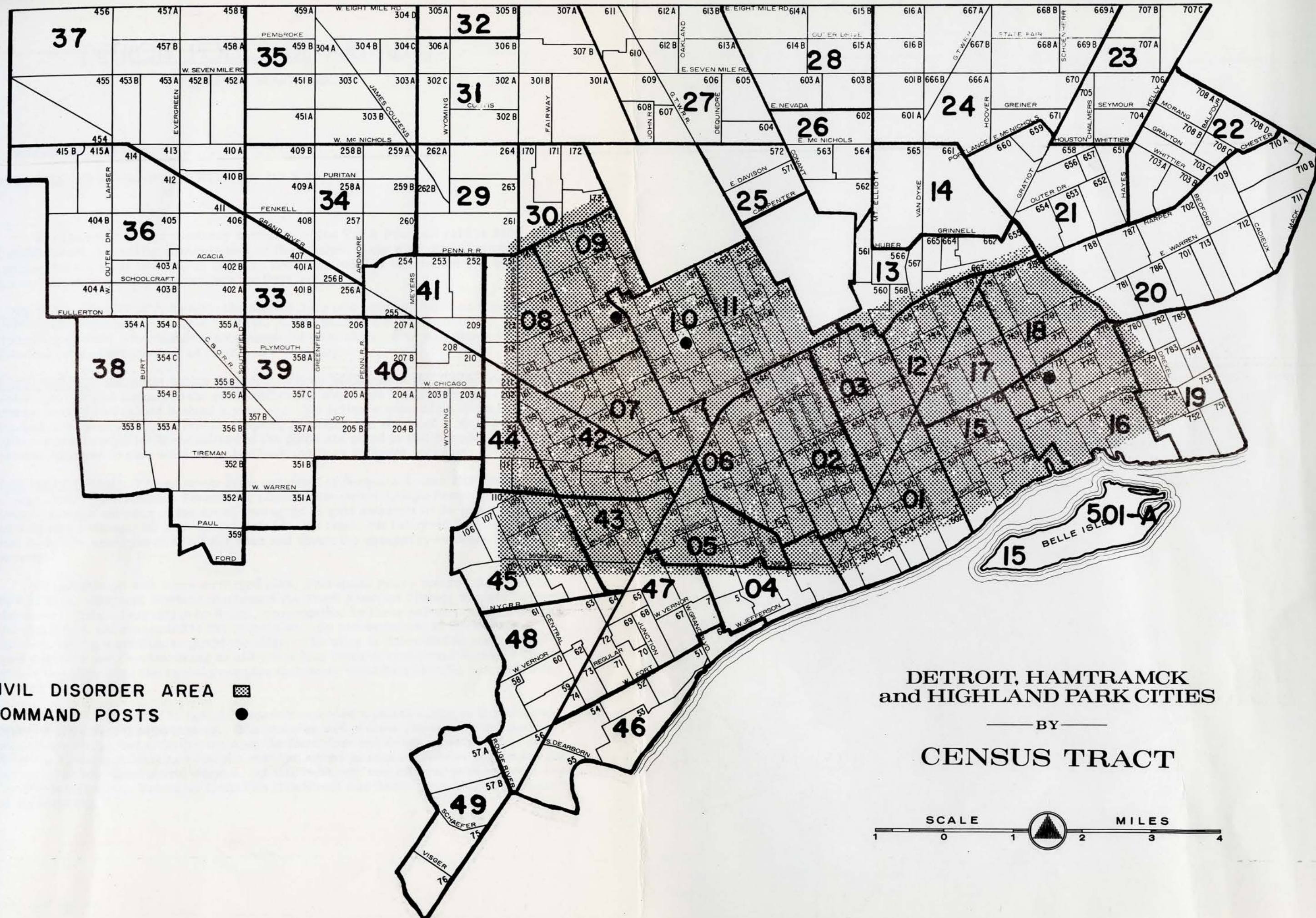


MAP # 1

## INTER-OFFICE MEMORANDUM

To: Commissioner Ray Girardin

Subject: PRELIMINARY SUMMARY OF EVENTS, JULY 23, 1967

The following is a preliminary summary of the Tenth Precinct raid at 9125 Twelfth Street, generally acknowledged as the catalyst in the civil disorder which commenced the early morning of July 23, 1967. Included in this report is a brief chronology of important occurrences the first day.

LOCATION: 9125 Twelfth Street - the second floor of a building listed as occupied by the United Community League for Civic Action holding a charter filed on November 5, 1964 - located over a commercial print shop. It is well known to Tenth Precinct police personnel as an after hours blind pig.

BACKGROUND: Sergeant Arthur Howison, officer in charge of the Tenth Precinct clean-up crew that conducted the raid, had known about this location for quite a while and personally had raided it about a year ago. He believes complaints about this location are recorded in the precinct liquor, gambling and vice book. He also believes previous police observations of the place are noted in that complaint book. Several attempts to gain admittance had been made on different occasions.

DETAILS OF RAID: The clean-up crew consisted of Sergeant Arthur Howison in charge, Patrolmen Anthony Fiermonti, Charles Henry and Joseph Brown. Patrolman Henry, a negro member of the crew, attempted to gain entrance to the premises earlier that evening. He was unsuccessful at this time, but informed Sergeant Howison that he felt he could get in at a later hour and obtain the necessary evidence to make arrests.

In accordance with a pre-arranged plan, Patrolman Henry entered the premises at 3:35 a.m. Sergeant Howison summoned the Tenth Precinct cruiser to meet him near the scene. Patrol Sergeant John Smith, accompanied by three patrolmen, was working Twelfth Street and responded to the scene also. He proceeded to the rear of the building, taking a position to guard the alley. The alley is described as making a 90° turn midblock and then becoming an alley in a long block of residential homes. The only exit to the alley from the raided premises is a heavy steel barred door, secured with a heavy padlock.

Just prior to entry, Sergeant Howison summoned a patrol wagon to the scene to expedite the transfer of prisoners. The clean-up and cruiser crews were refused admittance and gained entry by breaking the front door and an upper door. Upon entry Sergeant Howison determined that the raid had netted an unusual number of persons (82) and ordered additional patrol wagons. At this time only two or three persons were near the street entrance. Vehicular traffic on 12th Street was heavy, considering the hour of the morning.

The loading of the first wagon attracted ten to twenty spectators. They were in a jovial mood and exchanged comments with the people who were arrested. However, by the time the last wagon left the scene the crowd had grown to approximately 200 persons containing several unidentified agitators who were threatening the police and attempting to incite the crowd. Bottles were thrown by unknown persons at the officers and police cars from the rear of the crowd. The rear window of the cruiser was broken out as the last prisoners were loaded and the police departed. Several other scout cars had been to the scene and were departing also.

**POLICE RESPONSE:** Beginning at 5:00 a. m. the Communications Division records reveal runs and messages such as 5:00 a. m. - 12th and Clairmount - man shot; 5:05 a. m. - officer needs help; 14th and Gladstone - trouble; Linwood and Clairmount - all stores - being broken into.

Upon receiving information of the trouble on Twelfth Street, Lieutenant Raymond Good, the officer in charge of the Tenth Precinct, accompanied by Sergeant Lawrence Mulvihill, responded personally to the scene. He left the Tenth Precinct Station at 5:00 a. m. and proceeded to the trouble area. He recalls that while enroute a message was broadcast over the police radio for all cars to stay out of the area. However, he continued to 12th and Clairmount where he observed several hundred persons milling around. There was no looting at this time. A brick was thrown, striking Lieutenant Good in the head. He proceeded immediately from the area, picking up Patrolman Joseph Brown, another Negro officer from the clean-up crew, who had remained in the area alone. In a later statement Patrolman Brown reported seeing young groups running around throwing objects and breaking windows.

Lieutenant Good joined several other scout cars at Clairmount and the John Lodge Expressway where he used a police call box to notify Control Center Inspector Glinski of the situation.

Shortly after 5:00 a. m. Inspector Glinski called the weekly duty officer, District Inspector Anthony Bertoni, who in turn notified Deputy Superintendent John F. Nichols. District Inspector Bertoni instructed Inspector Glinski to secure sufficient cars from other precincts to quell the disorder.

A review of street patrol strength reveals that city wide, a total of 99 scout cars were working. This includes 5 one-man cars of the Motor Traffic Bureau. Also included in this total are 10 scout cars of the Tenth Precinct. The total personnel on duty in precincts and the Motor Traffic Bureau were 14 lieutenants, 25 sergeants, and 272 patrolmen. The number of patrolmen on street patrol was 193.

At 5:10 a. m. District Inspector Charles Gentry notified. At 5:15 a. m. Inspector Edward Mischnick, commanding officer of the Tenth Precinct notified. Both responded to the Tenth Precinct Station, arriving at approximately 5:45 a. m.

When apprized of the situation, District Inspector Gentry, at 6:15 a. m., ordered an immediate mobilization of the day platoon for all west side precincts. Inspector Mischnick ordered the day shift of the Tenth Precinct mobilized, then responded to the staging of police personnel at Clairmount and John Lodge. The staging area had been changed to Byron and Taylor. It has been determined that as rapidly as scout cars arrived, crews were doubled up and given immediate runs by the dispatcher. Inspector Mischnick reports that the dispatcher had more runs than available cars.

SUBSEQUENT EVENTS:

- 6:35 a. m. Superintendent Eugene Reuter, Deputy Superintendent John Nichols, District Inspector Anthony Bertoni arrived at Police Headquarters.
- 6:40 a. m. The Tactical Mobile Unit and Motorcycle Traffic Bureau mobilized.
- 6:42 a. m. Platoon No. 2 of precincts ordered mobilized per Deputy Nichols. Platoon No. 1 to remain on duty. TT 10324.
- 7:00 a. m. Michigan State Police notified. Commissioner Girardin notified Mayor Cavanagh.
- 7:07 a. m. Wayne County Sheriff's Office notified.
- 7:10 a. m. Col. H. Dryden, Michigan National Guard notified. Wife accepted information; Colonel at Grayling, Michigan.
- 7:20 a. m. All available personnel over minimal requirements ordered to Tenth Precinct.
- 8:35 a. m. Stationary Task Force to No. 10. Six sergeants and 45 patrolmen.
- 7:00 - 9:30 a. m. All units of department mobilized. The following additional agencies were notified: The FBI, Wayne County Sheriff's Office and Road Patrol, Prosecutor's Office, DPW, and Fire Department.
- 12:15 p. m. A guard of all vital service installations ordered by Director of Personnel.
- 2:00 p. m. Mayor Cavanagh requested 200 Michigan State Police Troopers.
- 3:05 p. m. National Guard Command General Noble Moore, Captain Stillson and Lieutenant Martini arrived at Police Headquarters.
- 3:05 p. m. 360 State Police Troopers arrived at 15000 W. Eight Mile National Guard Armory.
- 4:20 p. m. National Guard committed. Inspector Gentry met the Guard at Central High School to establish command post.
- 5:25 p. m. First Contingent of National Guard arrived at Central High School Command Post.
- 7:45 p. m. Mayor Cavanagh signed proclamation instituting curfew, 9:00 p. m. to 5:50 a. m.
- 9:30 p. m. All bars and theaters ordered closed city wide.

Throughout the entire day Detroit police officers, Michigan State Troopers, and National Guardsmen were committed to suppress the disorder as they became available. This report is a brief preliminary synopsis of significant events of the first day. Countless details are omitted, but are contained in the many official department records compiled during the week of July 23, 1967.



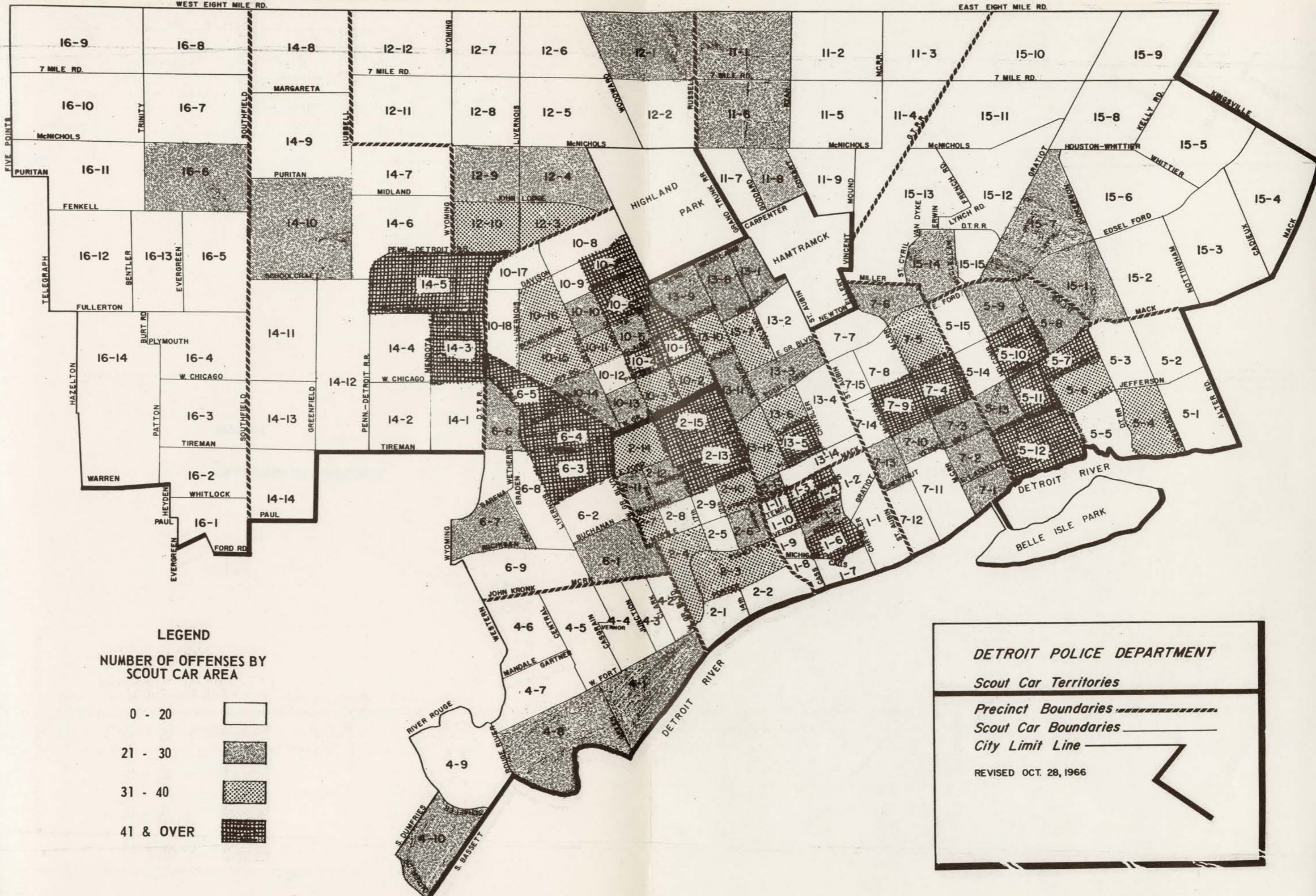

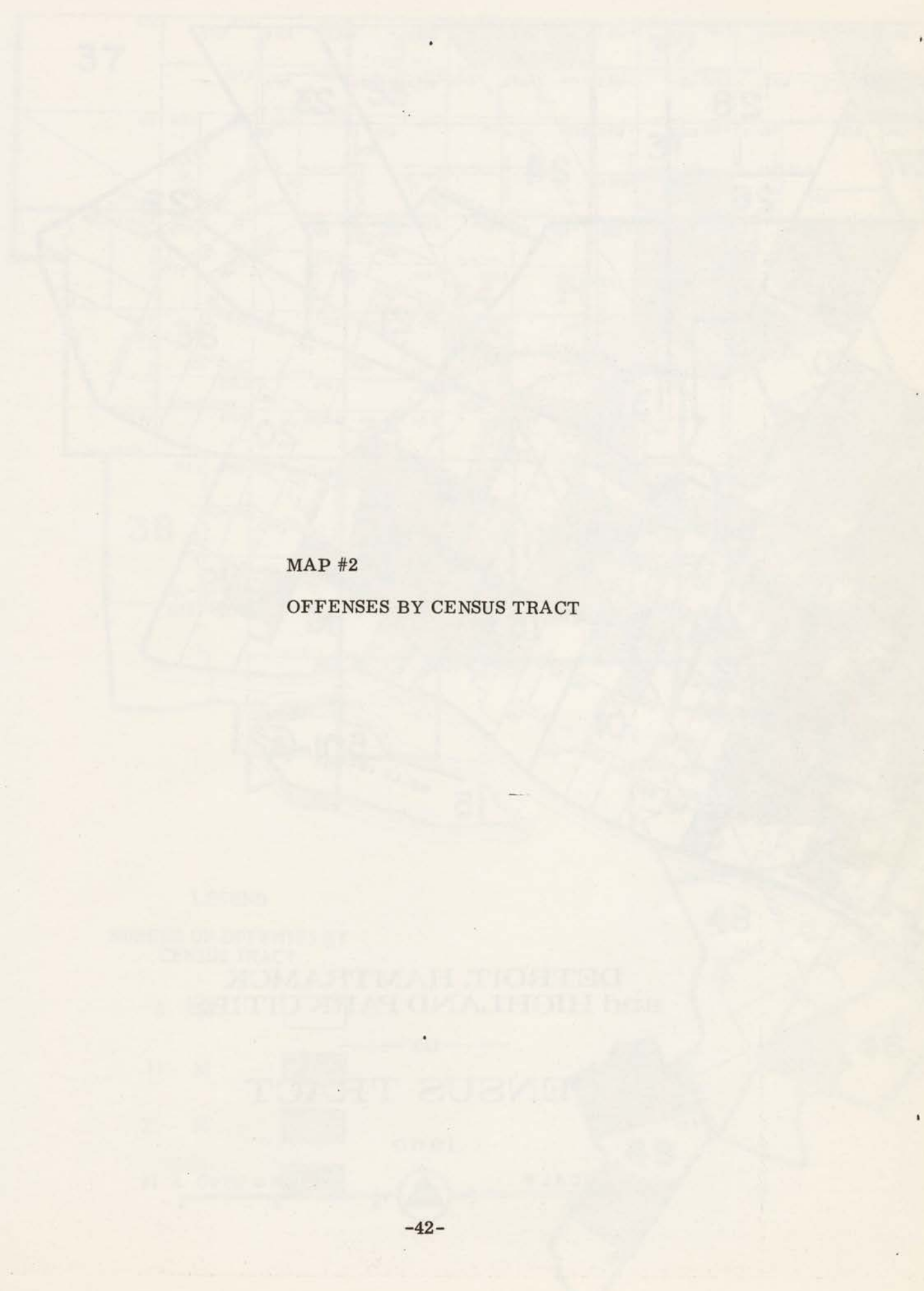

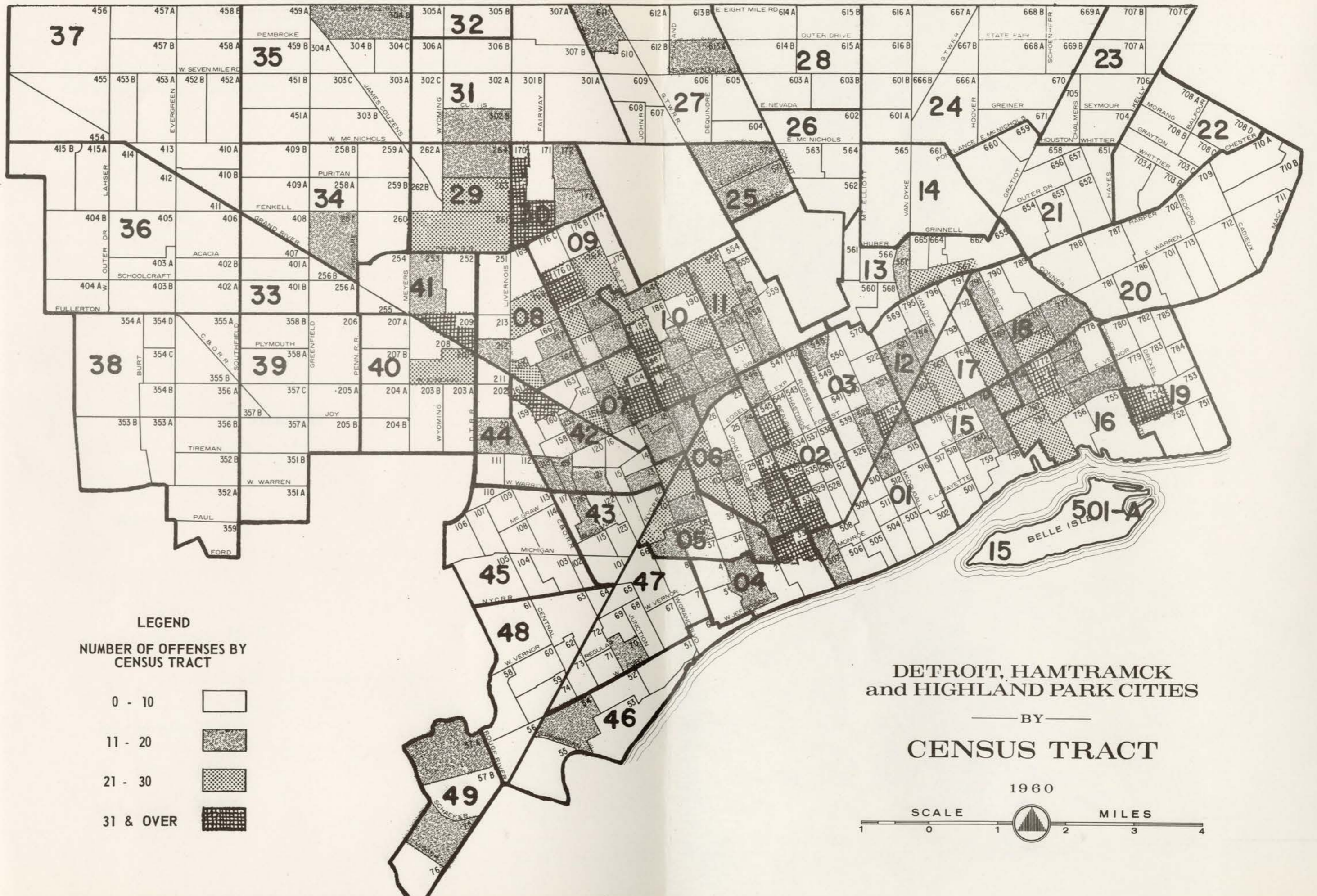
