SUBJECT: DEMONSTRATION - CLINTON AVENUE & BADGER AVENUE (RENT STRIKE)

At 10:15 A.M. a Demonstration on Housing took place at the above intersection - 416 Clinton Avenue and 406 Clinton Avenue - both apartment houses.

Mr. Robert Inlander, whose offices are located at 11 Hill Street, Newark, is the owner of 416 Clinton Avenue.

Shustack and Steinberg own the property located at 406 Clinton Street. Their offices are located at 910 Bergen Street.

There were sixty people on the picket line at one time. This line formed in front of 416 Clinton Avenue. Thirty minutes later, they formed a line in front of 406 Clinton Avenue.

At least ten of the pickets were the same as those observed at all Demonstrations in this City. There were some new faces - colored and white. Not all involved in this Demonstration walked. Some of them stayed across the street in the park. Pickets also had a few photographers on hand to take pictures of the Police. The picket line had at least three people under the influence of liquor. One Negro male was standing in the doorway with a pint of whiskey in his hand. The Police Photographer took this picture.

Most of the tenants did not take part in this Demonstration. In fact, very few of them did.

Present at the scene were John Barnes, of the Newark Human Rights Commission, and Louis Pitts, Freeholder. Earl Harris was also present there.

The tenants conducted tours for the Human Rights Commission and the Press - D. Eldridge of the Newark News - through the buildings, pointing out violations. This was an orderly Demonstration.

At 11:30, they marched back, in single file to their Headquarters at 716 Bergen Street. A paper passed out by them is submitted with this report.

Inspector Murphy and Acting Captain Morrison were present at the scene.

SUBJECT: RENT STRIKE DEMONSTRATION

Mr. Emmet Lee, Superintendent of 416 Clinton Avenue, stated that he has about ten tenants who refuse to pay their rent. Also, there are a number of tenants at 406 Clinton Avenue who are withholding their rents. He stated that they intend to hold their rents until repairs are made by the City or Landlords.

This Demonstration attracted about three hundred people, who were standing on the North side of Clinton Avenue, and in the park on Badger and Clinton Avenues.

Demonstrators sang hymns and freedom songs.

Robert Curvin of C.O.R.E. was in the picket line, along with other members of C.O.R.E. There were also members of Anvil Enterprises in the line.

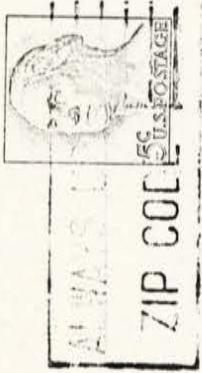



Dear Sisters:
Dear Brothers:

Clearly the Washington Mobilization was a good beginning, as the enclosed report testifies. However, it is clearer still that our main task lies ahead, that in every community we must keep highlighting and stressing the following points:

1. While it is true that we are fighting Communists, it is more profound to say that we have been intervening in another country's civil war.

2. Despite the billions of dollars of aid, the heroic labor and blood of many Americans, the Saigon government from Diem to Ky has been unable to talk convincingly to its people of national independence, land reform, and other forms of social justice.

3. The war is being waged in a fashion so out of character with American instincts of decency as seriously to undermine them (which is not to say that the VC's are boy scouts, which clearly they are not).

4. The strains of war have cut the funds that might otherwise be applied to anti-poverty efforts at home and abroad (which is the intelligent way to fight Communism).

5. The war would have a good chance of being negotiated to an end were we to stop bombing in North Vietnam.

In highlighting and stressing these points the following tactics are tried and true: public debates, often with a panel of reporters asking questions; public lectures, study seminars in synagogues and churches, letters to editors as well as to Senators and the White House; leafletting--good for the energies of youth; radio spots--this takes more money, but the money's well spent. Then may I recommend special evenings for influential ministers, priests, rabbis, with each of them bringing one or two influential laymen. Such meetings should produce new and important letters to the President and an overall strategy to involve the community in discussion and opposition to the war.


On the national level I am glad to announce seminarian Barry Johnson, now serving full time for a pittance; a book by Heschel, Brown, and Novak, which will appear shortly; also a

major address by Martin Luther King in New York City on April 4th. Happily, Dr. King is becoming more involved in the cause, and with his cooperation we may be able to plan something big.

Finally, let me report that on the day after the Washington Mobilization a self-professed "pagan" insisted on contributing \$10,000 anonymously, so moved was she by the whole affair. No less moving of course have been the single dollar bills we constantly receive from nuns all over the country. But, dear Brothers, Sisters, more of course is needed and preferably on a steady basis. May I suggest that your group consider tithing on a monthly basis, for such a system would help us plan ahead, particularly for the financially leaner summer months. I guess I feel guilty but not that guilty for pushing you on this. All of us, after all, are in this together, and national board members simply have not the time to plan, speak, write, telephone, and raise all the money.

God bless you and sustain us all with the kind of undeserved integrity we get when we know we are in the right fight.

CHRISTIANS CONCERNED ABOUT VIETNAM

Washington, D. C.

DEMONSTRATIONS of one sort or another have become a staple of Washington life, so much so that the newsmen who overflow this city no longer pay much attention as each new group of picketers arrives in town and the shuffle of protesting feet is heard once more on the broad, tree-canopied sidewalk in front of 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue. But if, as a result of the surfeit, the nation's newspapers missed the import of the 30-hour "Mobilization" mounted on Jan. 31 and Feb. 1 by the ad hoc Clergy and Laymen Concerned About Vietnam, there is reason to believe that influential members of Washington officialdom—both in the Executive branch and on Capitol Hill—did not.

This was one of those occasions whose significance defies the procedures of conventional reportage, an event where the news lies with the footsoldiers, numerous and unnameable, and not with the generals. It came as no surprise that two of the Mobilization's most visible generals, the Reverends Robert McAfee Brown and William Sloane Coffin, find the war in Vietnam grotesque and abhorrent, and that they are able to say so with eloquence and passion. Moral postures of themselves, however, leave the average American politician unmoved. In the prag-

matic and nonmoral context in which American governmental decisions are most often made, Brown and Coffin speak for and from constituencies whose opposition to the war is already known, whose political potency has already been weighed by the policymakers and discounted as negligible.

But for those who followed in their train, that was another matter. Among the 2,000-odd churchmen who mounted the hour's silent protest before the White House and spent much of the balance of their visit lobbying, home-state senators and representatives were not only the familiar bag of veteran clerical agitators (not really a pejorative, when you stop to think about it) but also scores of pastors of those peaceful, comfortable, conventional congregations that every politician likes to think he grew up in.

This datum was not overlooked by the officeholders. At one Capitol Hill confrontation, the political antennae of an earnest Southern Senator practically performed a pavane on his scalp as he pressed his callers to tell him what churches they came from and eagerly inquired how many friends of the cloth they had back home who felt the same way they did. This Senator—and there are many like him—has so far "gone along" on the war. But, pending more conclusive word from the home folks, he has had little to say about it.

Putting 2,000 people on the sidewalk in front of the White House is not of itself a remarkable feat. With a professional organization and, even more important, money, it's a cinch. But when the 2,000 come from virtually every part of the country, interrupting their schedules at midweek and traveling at their own expense or on purses raised among

friends, when the professional organization consists of the energetic Rev. Richard Fernandez and little else, the sensitive Washington-watcher begins to wonder if maybe something's happening out there in the hinterland. In the final frantic hours before the Mobilization began, one surmised Fernandez wished he could grow two or three more sets of ears just so he could answer those jangling telephones. His claim that two additional staff people could have added thousands more to the roster of the mobilized was easy to believe.

This very breadth of background and temperament, which made the Mobilization potentially significant politically, was—oddly, but perhaps predictably—distasteful to some of the true believers in the crowd. During the final mass meeting at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church (Mobilization headquarters), one seminarian, who found Sen. Eugene McCarthy's modestly worded critique of the war an unacceptable companion to the crowd-pleasing eruptions of Senators Wayne Morse and Ernest Gruening, passed hastily written index cards through the congregation urging that it show its disapproval of the Minnesotan's remarks by withholding applause.

Shortly afterwards a rump gathering of Roman Catholics—carefully enumerated by their spokesman as 46 priests, 37 laymen and 4 nuns—formally disassociated themselves from a talk delivered by the Rev. John Cronin, a staff member of the National Catholic Welfare Conference. They took exception to his reasoning that it is a political judgment rather than a moral decision to insist that a halt in the bombing of North Vietnam would lead to peace negotiations.

Whether the Mobilization will have a continuing impact, whether it represented the leading edge of a determined mass effort by men of religion to alter the direction of Administration policy in Vietnam will grow clearer in coming weeks. More than 300 participants went home with what may prove to be the peacemaker's most potent propaganda tool: the set of haunting and horrifying photographs of napalmed Vietnamese children. The political effect of these increasingly widely-circulating photographs has not yet been felt here, but they are sufficiently distressing to raise deep questions in the hearts of all but the most cold-blooded of anti-Communist crusaders.

Those who scourge the churches for being the last to climb aboard the civil rights train—a favorite sport among some advanced-thinking clerics—sometimes fail to give due credit to what the churches accomplished politically once they finally were roused from slumber. Observers agree that it was the moral outrage that welled up among unsophisticated, church-going, Bible-studying residents of Smalltown, USA, as much as anything else, that shaped the legislative events of 1964 and 1965.

If that same kind of moral outrage is now abuilding over American activities in Vietnam, then, Lyndon Johnson, watch out!

"We Got To Live Here" shows conditions in the Newark ghetto where NCUP began its work. Narrated by people from the community. 25 minutes.

"Troublemakers" is a film about community organizing in a Newark, N.J. ghetto.

The film covers three months in the history of the Newark Community Union Project (NCUP), a neighborhood organization begun in the summer of 1964 by Students for a Democratic Society, and now become an independent group, staffed by people from the community and former students.

The film follows four distinct stories:

- the formation of a new block group
- the attempt to get housing code enforcement in one building
- efforts to get a traffic light installed
- NCUP's participation in a political campaign.

The film makers spent over one year in the neighborhood, becoming familiar and involved with local people. The result is an unrehearsed drama- a portrayal of the ordinary reality of community organizing.

"Troublemakers" is sympathetic to its subject matter. It has been enthusiastically received by the people who appear in it. Yet the film makers have preserved an independent view. The film does not speak for NCUP or for any of its staff or members.

"Troublemakers" has already proven useful to
community organization
civil rights groups
anti-poverty groups
church groups
organizers' training sessions.
It will stimulate interest and discussion in highschool, college, and graduate classes in civics, current events, sociology and social work.

"Troublemakers" has high credentials in the world of film making. It was one of two new American films shown at the Fourth New York Film Festival at Lincoln Center this year. It has been selected to be shown at the Film Festivals at San Francisco, London, and East Germany.

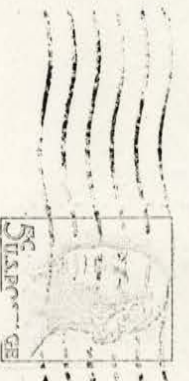

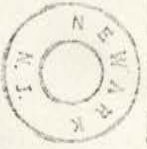
