Dear Mr. Jenkins,

It has been suggested to me by Frank Wozencraft of Dallas and others that I see you.

My employment by the Senate Committee on the Judiciary, which started in 1956, will end this month.

I need to meet financial obligations incurred for the education of my twin girls and two boys, only one of whom has completed his education.

My grandfather was well known in Texas for bringing in Scottish money after the War when the North would not lend. He had a 165,000 acre ranch near Benavides which is now covered with oil derricks, but he sold it just before he died. The family home in Texas was at 2216 McCullough Avenue, San Antonio, until my aunts died, having used up the inheritance.

When I was shortly to be made a partner of the big Wall Street firm of Cravath, Swaine & Moore, I left on 90 days' ~~leave~~ to help stem the depression and stayed on from time to time upon request ever since (in key staff positions, except when Ike abolished my agency in the Executive Office).

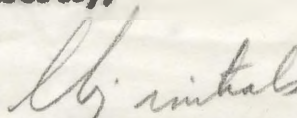

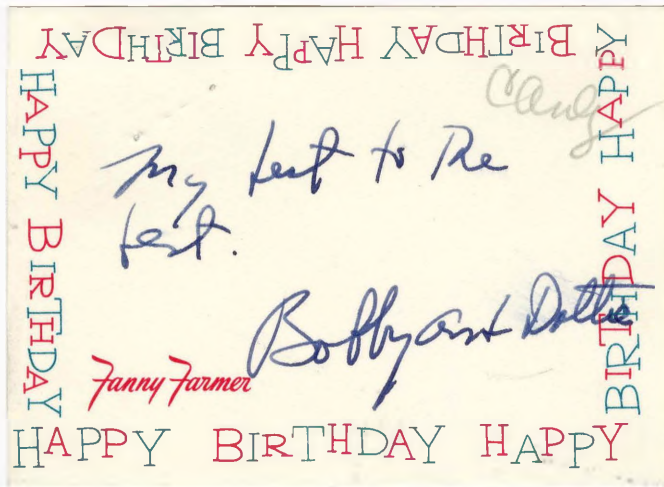
