UNITED STATES SENATE

STATEMENT OF RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES OF CANDIDATE FOR ELECTION AS UNITED STATES SENATOR

(To be filed with the SECRETARY OF THE SENATE, WASHINGTON, D. C., within thirty days AFTER the general or special election. The depositing of this statement in an established post office, duly stamped, registered, and directed to the Secretary of the Senate, Washington, D. C., within the prescribed time, is a sufficient filing of the statement. In the event it is not received, a duplicate of such statement shall be promptly filed upon notice by the Secretary of the Senate of its nonreceipt.)

TITLE III.—FEDERAL CORRUPT PRACTICES ACT, 1925 (Forty-third Statutes at Large, page 1070)

SEC. 301. This title may be cited as the "Federal Corrupt Practices Act, 1925."

SEC. 302. When used in this title—

(a) The term "election" includes a general or special election, and, in the case of a Resident Commissioner from the Philippine Islands, an election by the Philippine Legislature, but does not include a PRIMARY ELECTION or convention of a political party;

(b) The term "candidate" means an individual whose name is presented at an election for election as Senator or Representative in, or Delegate or Resident Commissioner to, the Congress of the United States, whether or not such individual is elected;

(d) The term "contribution" includes a gift, subscription, loan, advance, or deposit, of money, or anything of value, and includes a contract, promise, or agreement, whether or not legally enforceable, to make a contribution;

(e) The term "expenditure" includes a payment, distribution, loan, advance, deposit, or gift, of money, or anything of value, and includes a contract, promise, or agreement, whether or not legally enforceable, to make an expenditure;

(g) The term "Clerk" means the Clerk of the House of Representatives of the United States;

(h) The term "Secretary" means the Secretary of the Senate of the United States.

SEC. 307. (a) Every candidate for Senator shall file with the Secretary and every candidate for Representative, Delegate, or Resident Commissioner shall file with the Clerk not less than ten nor more than fifteen days before, and also within thirty days after, the date on which an election is to be held, a statement containing, complete as of the day next preceding the date of filing—

(1) A correct and itemized account of each contribution received by him or by any person for him with his knowledge or consent, from any source, in aid or support of his candidacy for election, or for the purpose of influencing the result of the election, together with the name of the person who has made such contribution;

(2) A correct and itemized account of each expenditure made by him or by any person for him with his knowledge or consent, in aid or support of his candidacy for election, or for the purpose of influencing the result of the election, together with the name of the person to whom such expenditure was made; except that only the total sum of expenditures for items specified in subdivision (c) of section 309 need be stated;

(3) A statement of every promise or pledge made by him or by any person for him with his consent, prior to the closing of the polls on the day of the election, relative to the appointment or recommendation for appointment of any person to any public or private position or employment for the purpose of procuring support in his candidacy, and the name, address, and occupation of every person to whom any such promise or pledge has been made, together with the description of any such position. If no such promise or pledge has been made, that fact shall be specifically stated.

(b) The statements required to be filed by subdivision (a) shall be cumulative, but where there has been no change in an item reported in a previous statement only the amount need be carried forward.

(c) Every candidate shall enclose with his first statement a report, based upon the records of the proper State official, stating the total number of votes cast for all candidates for the office which the candidate seeks, at the general election next preceding the election at which he is a candidate.

SEC. 308. A statement required by this title to be filed by a candidate or treasurer of a political committee or other person with the Clerk or Secretary, as the case may be—

(a) Shall be verified by the oath or affirmation of the person filing such statement, taken before any officer authorized to administer oaths;

(b) Shall be deemed properly filed when deposited in an established post office within the prescribed time, duly stamped, registered, and directed to the Clerk or Secretary at Washington, District of Columbia, but in the event it is not received, a duplicate of such statement shall be promptly filed upon notice by the Clerk or Secretary of its nonreceipt;

(c) Shall be preserved by the Clerk or Secretary for a period of two years from the date of filing, shall constitute a part of the public records of his office, and shall be open to public inspection.

SEC. 309. (a) A candidate, in his campaign for election, shall not make expenditures in excess of the amount which he may lawfully make under the laws of the State in which he is a candidate, nor in excess of the amount which he may lawfully make under the provisions of this title.

(b) Unless the laws of his State prescribe a less amount as the maximum limit of campaign expenditures, a candidate may make expenditures up to—

(1) The sum of \$10,000 if a candidate for Senator, or the sum of \$2,500 if a candidate for Representative, Delegate, or Resident Commissioner; or

(2) An amount equal to the amount obtained by multiplying three cents by the total number of votes cast at the last general election for all candidates for the office which the candidate seeks, but in no event exceeding \$25,000 if a candidate for Senator or \$5,000 if a candidate for Representative, Delegate, or Resident Commissioner.

(c) Money expended by a candidate to meet and discharge any assessment, fee, or charge made or levied upon candidates by the laws of the State in which he resides, or expended for his necessary personal, traveling, or subsistence expenses, or for stationery, postage, writing, or printing (other than for use on billboards or in newspapers), for distributing letters, circulars, or posters, or for telegraph or telephone service, shall not be included in determining whether his expenditures have exceeded the sum fixed by paragraph (1) or (2) of subdivision (b) as the limit of campaign expenses of a candidate.

SEC. 310. It is unlawful for any candidate to directly or indirectly promise or pledge the appointment, or the use of his influence or support for the appointment of any person to any public or private position or employment, for the purpose of procuring support in his candidacy.

SEC. 311. It is unlawful for any person to make or offer to make an expenditure, or to cause an expenditure to be made or offered, to any person, either to vote or withhold his vote, or to vote for or against any candidate, and it is unlawful for any person to solicit, accept, or receive any such expenditure in consideration of his vote or the withholding of his vote.

SEC. 312. Section 118 of the Act entitled "An Act to codify, revise, and amend the penal laws of the United States," approved March 4, 1909, is amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 118. It is unlawful for any Senator or Representative in, or Delegate or Resident Commissioner to, Congress, or any candidate for, or individual elected as Senator, Representative, Delegate or Resident Commissioner, or any officer or employee of the United States or any person receiving any salary or compensation for services from money derived from the Treasury of the United States, to directly or indirectly solicit, receive, or be in any manner concerned in soliciting or receiving, any assessment, subscription, or contribution for any political purpose whatever, from any other such officer, employee, or person."

SEC. 314. (a) Any person who violates any of the foregoing provisions of this title, except those for which a specific penalty is imposed by sections 312 and 313, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both.

(b) Any person who willfully violates any of the foregoing provisions of this title, except those for which a specific penalty is imposed by sections 312 and 313, shall be fined not more than \$10,000 and imprisoned not more than two years.

SEC. 315. This title shall not limit or affect the right of any person to make expenditures for proper legal expenses in contesting the results of an election.

SEC. 316. This title shall not be construed to annul the laws of any State relating to the nomination or election of candidates, unless directly inconsistent with the provisions of this title, or to exempt any candidate from complying with such State laws.

SEC. 317. If any provision of this title or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the validity of the remainder of the Act and of the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

SEC. 318. The following Acts and parts of Acts are hereby repealed: The Act entitled "An Act providing for publicity of contributions made for the purpose of influencing elections at which Representatives in Congress are elected," approved June 25, 1910 (chapter 392, Thirty-sixth Statutes, page 822), and the Acts amendatory thereof, approved August 19, 1911 (chapter 33, Thirty-seventh Statutes, page 25), and August 23, 1912 (chapter 349, Thirty-seventh Statutes, page 360); the Act entitled "An Act to prevent corrupt practices in the election of Senators, Representatives, or Delegates in Congress," approved October 16, 1918 (chapter 187, Fortieth Statutes, page 1013); and section 83 of the Criminal Code of the United States, approved March 4, 1909 (chapter 321, Thirty-fifth Statutes, page 1088).

SEC. 319. This title shall take effect thirty days after its enactment.

Approved, February 28, 1925.

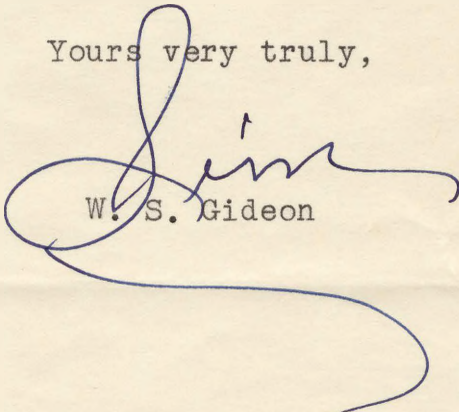

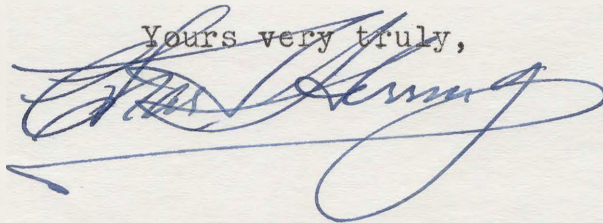

MEMORANDUM TO ALL LYNDON JOHNSON LEADERS:

There are exactly four weeks remaining in the campaign. Before we know it we will be in the home stretch. Lyndon Johnson's success one month from today will depend upon the efforts of his friends like you. His success will further depend upon the coordination of all our efforts. Because of this fact, we are passing on to you certain pertinent suggestions which, if carried out in every section of the State, will assure his election.

1. RADIO.—We all know the importance of the use of radio in a political campaign. In addition, we know that the speaker must be given the best possible radio audience. For this reason, you will find attached hereto a radio schedule showing the date and time of each of the candidate's broadcasts. With this schedule it is possible for you to make plans for each broadcast. Announcements should be made in all local papers every time he is to be on the air.

One good way in which to add to the radio audience is to arrange for radio parties at which time people should be invited to various places in your community to listen to the candidate. This can be very effective by inviting voters who are undecided in their choice in this race. In some places our friends have arranged for public radio reception by having loud speakers at some prominent public place.

Regardless of the wisdom of the above suggestions, we must do everything possible to get as many people as possible to hear Lyndon Johnson.

2. LITERATURE.—We are mailing from this office thousands of pieces of literature every day. We have volunteer workers traveling over the State distributing literature. However, without a State-wide Johnson organization functioning in some manner in every county, the message of Roosevelt, Johnson, and National Unity may not reach enough people during the next thirty days. We must therefore depend on you and your friends to see that the voters of your county get this message.

Johnson literature should find its way into every house in the county. All public gatherings should be well covered with literature. Certain types of special literature should be used where they will be most effective; that is, our Rural Electrification folder should be distributed in communities which have no electric power, et cetera. In order that you may be familiar with what literature is available, we are enclosing a sample of each type.

We are also enclosing an order blank which should be filled out and returned to this office as soon as possible, showing the amount of each kind of literature you will need during the next four weeks.

3. POST CARDS.--Several hundred thousand post cards have already been mailed by friends of Lyndon Johnson to their friends over the State. The other day a very prominent citizen told the Congressman that he could not help but support him, because he had received post cards from seventeen of his friends throughout Texas. This is one example of the effectiveness of a post card campaign.

We are also enclosing several of these cards, and hope that you will advise us exactly how many you and your friends can send out, as well as how many you can place in the hands of others who will mail them. This personal message, going into every county for the next thirty days, will add to the momentum of the campaign and assure a maximum number of personal contacts.

4. CAR STICKERS.--Today Lyndon Johnson has more car stickers on cars than all other candidates combined; however, this may not be true one week from today, because of the fact that O'Daniel is concentrating on a car sticker campaign. By redoubling our efforts in this respect we will be able to counteract the effect of his efforts.

In many places our friends are enlisting the services of young men and women to place stickers on automobiles. In one city last Saturday a squad of University students stationed at the main intersections, placed 2800 stickers on automobiles with the permission of the drivers.

5. PLACARDS.--The more people who see Lyndon Johnson's picture and name within the next four weeks the more votes he will have on election day. It is very important that placards be displayed in all prominent business places and along the highways leading into every town in the State. This can also be accomplished by securing the services of young men who are anxious to help another young man who has been of such great assistance to so many of them.

Placards should also be well displayed as near as possible to all voting boxes the morning of the election.

6. SPEAKERS.--This office will send out speakers to every public meeting where local speakers are not available. Please advise us of all public affairs such as political rallies, barbecues, picnics, et cetera, and we will endeavor to have a very capable speaker on hand for you.

If you have men in your county who will be available for such dates elsewhere, please let us add their names to our Speakers' Bureau.

7. GETTING OUT THE VOTE.--Regardless of the strength of any candidate, unless he can get the votes out on election day he can hardly make a creditable showing.

Telephone committees should be organized and functioning the day before and the morning of the election. Transportation committees are very important, and there should be one or more cars available in each precinct, depending upon the number of people in that precinct.

Your County committee should be ready to work every precinct thoroughly from now until the election, particularly to getting out the vote on election day. By getting out the vote we mean the Johnson vote. In order to be effective the opposition votes should not be encouraged to go to the polls; therefore, this "get out the vote" should be confined to those voters who are now for Johnson and those who can be converted between now and June 28.

8. ORGANIZATION.--The above outlined suggestions can not possibly be accomplished without a functioning organization throughout your county. You should see that every precinct is organized to accomplish the above mentioned things which, if accomplished, will mean that you have contributed to a great extent to the election of Lyndon Johnson.

Group support can and will determine the outcome of this campaign. By group support we mean that every county organization should include a representative of every group in the county. For example, the Johnson organization should include the following:

(a) FARMERS.--There should be some man to contact every farmer in the county and carry Lyndon Johnson's farm message to them. Our Rural Electrification folder should be used extensively among this group.

(b) WOMEN.--A womens' organization should be formed to work with the central committee. We have a Womens' Bureau in our State Headquarters which is contacting women throughout the State, and should have the name of some leader in your county through whom to work.

This type of work should be so set up that on election day every part of it will be at work and functioning to get out the maximum number of Johnson votes.

Please let us hear from you as soon as possible regarding the literature which you will need, and any information which will benefit you with reference to the above outlined suggestions, in order that we might evidence a maximum vote on June 28.

Your cooperation will be appreciated not only by Lyndon Johnson, but by all his other friends, who, like yourself, are endeavoring to elevate him to the United States Senate.

Enclosed you will find letter from the Lone
Star Chain, which is self explanatory.

I think that you and John should know that at
least one of the Directors of the Authority has
stated on one or two occasions that John was not in-
terested in the Authority - that he did not attend
all the Board meetings and that he did not attend
any of the committee meetings. There is to be a meet-
ing of the Auditing and Finance Committee on Monday
the 28th of July for the purpose of discussing and
probably deciding upon what said committee will recom-
mend as compensation to be paid to all persons con-
nected with the Authority, beginning January 1, 1942,
which is after the date when the present construction
program will be completed. I think John is a member
of this committee.

As you know, the Board of Directors, as a re-
sult of the meeting held with you in Washington, de-
cided to have a member stay in Austin at all times.
I think Pennington was under the impression that John
was going to be in Austin during the week of the 28th
of July. If I am correct in this understanding, and
John did not get in touch with Pennington before he
left, I think that it might be advisable for John to
wire or write Pennington air mail telling him that he
cannot be here (if he does not plan to be here on the
28th).

I discussed the above matters with Senator and
he said that I should write to you and tell you and
John so that you would be fully advised, and that is

UNITED STATES SENATE

STATEMENT OF RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES OF CANDIDATE FOR ELECTION AS UNITED STATES SENATOR

(To be filed with the SECRETARY OF THE SENATE, WASHINGTON, D. C., within thirty days AFTER the general or special election. The depositing of this statement in an established post office, duly stamped, registered, and directed to the Secretary of the Senate, Washington, D. C., within the prescribed time, is a sufficient filing of the statement. In the event it is not received, a duplicate of such statement shall be promptly filed upon notice by the Secretary of the Senate of its nonreceipt.)

TITLE III.—FEDERAL CORRUPT PRACTICES ACT, 1925 (Forty-third Statutes at Large, page 1070)

SEC. 301. This title may be cited as the "Federal Corrupt Practices Act, 1925."

SEC. 302. When used in this title—

(a) The term "election" includes a general or special election, and, in the case of a Resident Commissioner from the Philippine Islands, an election by the Philippine Legislature, but does not include a PRIMARY ELECTION or convention of a political party;

(b) The term "candidate" means an individual whose name is presented at an election for election as Senator or Representative in, or Delegate or Resident Commissioner to, the Congress of the United States, whether or not such individual is elected;

(d) The term "contribution" includes a gift, subscription, loan, advance, or deposit, of money, or anything of value, and includes a contract, promise, or agreement, whether or not legally enforceable, to make a contribution;

(e) The term "expenditure" includes a payment, distribution, loan, advance, deposit, or gift, of money, or anything of value, and includes a contract, promise, or agreement, whether or not legally enforceable, to make an expenditure;

(g) The term "Clerk" means the Clerk of the House of Representatives of the United States;

(h) The term "Secretary" means the Secretary of the Senate of the United States.

SEC. 307. (a) Every candidate for Senator shall file with the Secretary and every candidate for Representative, Delegate, or Resident Commissioner shall file with the Clerk not less than ten nor more than fifteen days before, and also within thirty days after, the date on which an election is to be held, a statement containing, complete as of the day next preceding the date of filing—

(1) A correct and itemized account of each contribution received by him or by any person for him with his knowledge or consent, from any source, in aid or support of his candidacy for election, or for the purpose of influencing the result of the election, together with the name of the person who has made such contribution;

(2) A correct and itemized account of each expenditure made by him or by any person for him with his knowledge or consent, in aid or support of his candidacy for election, or for the purpose of influencing the result of the election, together with the name of the person to whom such expenditure was made; except that only the total sum of expenditures for items specified in subdivision (c) of section 309 need be stated;

(3) A statement of every promise or pledge made by him or by any person for him with his consent, prior to the closing of the polls on the day of the election, relative to the appointment or recommendation for appointment of any person to any public or private position or employment for the purpose of procuring support in his candidacy, and the name, address, and occupation of every person to whom any such promise or pledge has been made, together with the description of any such position. If no such promise or pledge has been made, that fact shall be specifically stated.

(b) The statements required to be filed by subdivision (a) shall be cumulative, but where there has been no change in an item reported in a previous statement only the amount need be carried forward.

(c) Every candidate shall enclose with his first statement a report, based upon the records of the proper State official, stating the total number of votes cast for all candidates for the office which the candidate seeks, at the general election next preceding the election at which he is a candidate.

SEC. 308. A statement required by this title to be filed by a candidate or treasurer of a political committee or other person with the Clerk or Secretary, as the case may be—

(a) Shall be verified by the oath or affirmation of the person filing such statement, taken before any officer authorized to administer oaths;

(b) Shall be deemed properly filed when deposited in an established post office within the prescribed time, duly stamped, registered, and directed to the Clerk or Secretary at Washington, District of Columbia, but in the event it is not received, a duplicate of such statement shall be promptly filed upon notice by the Clerk or Secretary of its nonreceipt;

(c) Shall be preserved by the Clerk or Secretary for a period of two years from the date of filing, shall constitute a part of the public records of his office, and shall be open to public inspection.

SEC. 309. (a) A candidate, in his campaign for election, shall not make expenditures in excess of the amount which he may lawfully make under the laws of the State in which he is a candidate, nor in excess of the amount which he may lawfully make under the provisions of this title.

(b) Unless the laws of his State prescribe a less amount as the maximum limit of campaign expenditures, a candidate may make expenditures up to—

(1) The sum of \$10,000 if a candidate for Senator, or the sum of \$2,500 if a candidate for Representative, Delegate, or Resident Commissioner; or

(2) An amount equal to the amount obtained by multiplying three cents by the total number of votes cast at the last general election for all candidates for the office which the candidate seeks, but in no event exceeding \$25,000 if a candidate for Senator or \$5,000 if a candidate for Representative, Delegate, or Resident Commissioner.

(c) Money expended by a candidate to meet and discharge any assessment, fee, or charge made or levied upon candidates by the laws of the State in which he resides, or expended for his necessary personal, traveling, or subsistence expenses, or for stationery, postage, writing, or printing (other than for use on billboards or in newspapers), for distributing letters, circulars, or posters, or for telegraph or telephone service, shall not be included in determining whether his expenditures have exceeded the sum fixed by paragraph (1) or (2) of subdivision (b) as the limit of campaign expenses of a candidate.

SEC. 310. It is unlawful for any candidate to directly or indirectly promise or pledge the appointment, or the use of his influence or support for the appointment of any person to any public or private position or employment, for the purpose of procuring support in his candidacy.

SEC. 311. It is unlawful for any person to make or offer to make an expenditure, or to cause an expenditure to be made or offered, to any person, either to vote or withhold his vote, or to vote for or against any candidate, and it is unlawful for any person to solicit, accept, or receive any such expenditure in consideration of his vote or the withholding of his vote.

SEC. 312. Section 118 of the Act entitled "An Act to codify, revise, and amend the penal laws of the United States," approved March 4, 1909, is amended to read as follows:

"SEC. 118. It is unlawful for any Senator or Representative in, or Delegate or Resident Commissioner to, Congress, or any candidate for, or individual elected as Senator, Representative, Delegate or Resident Commissioner, or any officer or employee of the United States or any person receiving any salary or compensation for services from money derived from the Treasury of the United States, to directly or indirectly solicit, receive, or be in any manner concerned in soliciting or receiving, any assessment, subscription, or contribution for any political purpose whatever, from any other such officer, employee, or person."

SEC. 314. (a) Any person who violates any of the foregoing provisions of this title, except those for which a specific penalty is imposed by sections 312 and 313, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both.

(b) Any person who willfully violates any of the foregoing provisions of this title, except those for which a specific penalty is imposed by sections 312 and 313, shall be fined not more than \$10,000 and imprisoned not more than two years.

SEC. 315. This title shall not limit or affect the right of any person to make expenditures for proper legal expenses in contesting the results of an election.

SEC. 316. This title shall not be construed to annul the laws of any State relating to the nomination or election of candidates, unless directly inconsistent with the provisions of this title, or to exempt any candidate from complying with such State laws.

SEC. 317. If any provision of this title or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the validity of the remainder of the Act and of the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

SEC. 318. The following Acts and parts of Acts are hereby repealed: The Act entitled "An Act providing for publicity of contributions made for the purpose of influencing elections at which Representatives in Congress are elected," approved June 25, 1910 (chapter 392, Thirty-sixth Statutes, page 822), and the Acts amendatory thereof, approved August 19, 1911 (chapter 33, Thirty-seventh Statutes, page 25), and August 23, 1912 (chapter 349, Thirty-seventh Statutes, page 360); the Act entitled "An Act to prevent corrupt practices in the election of Senators, Representatives, or Delegates in Congress," approved October 16, 1918 (chapter 187, Fortieth Statutes, page 1013); and section 83 of the Criminal Code of the United States, approved March 4, 1909 (chapter 321, Thirty-fifth Statutes, page 1088).

SEC. 319. This title shall take effect thirty days after its enactment.

Approved, February 28, 1925.
