

Congressman Lyndon Johnson was the ONLY Texas Congressman who voted against an amendment to OPA regulations which would have placed crude oil on a price parity with other products.

The SPEAKER. The Clerk will report the first amendment on which a separate vote has been demanded.

The Clerk read as follows:

Amendment offered by Mr. DISNEY: Page 12, line 2, insert a new subsection (n) to read as follows:

"In the fixing of prices for crude petroleum and the products thereof and derivatives

therefrom, as provided under the Price Control Act of 1942, as amended, consideration shall be given to the necessity for exploring for crude petroleum and the maintenance of a competitive position in the petroleum industry and to that end shall give consideration to the parity prices as indicated by the relationship between the index based on the national average price of crude petroleum and the index of all commodities as reported by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, in its Wholesale Commodity Price Index based on the year 1928: *Provided, however,* That such ceilings shall not be fixed or maintained at less than 80 percent of parity and not to exceed parity, per barrel above the present respective price ceilings for crude petroleum, and its products and derivatives."

The SPEAKER. The question is on the amendment.

Dear Friend:

I hope you will not mind my presuming upon our common bond as residents and voters of Young County to write you on a matter in which I am deeply interested -- the forthcoming run-off primary for United States Senator.

As many of you know, I was reared in Young County, my home is there, I vote there, and my mother and other members of my family live there. I came to Washington a number of years ago and have served in three Congressional offices, in addition to the office of the late beloved Senator Sheppard. After the death of Senator Sheppard, Congressman Lyndon Johnson gave me a position in his office, where I have continued until the present time.

Naturally, in this run-off primary, I have a personal interest -- but over and above this is my interest as a citizen in wanting to determine what is best for Texas.

From my experience I have come to realize the numerous complexities of our legislative and departmental procedures, and that only through knowledge of these procedures are prompt and effective results accomplished. A new member of Congress, without previous experience, is compelled to spend most of his first term merely in being educated in the complicated machinery of the Federal government. In these pressing times it seems to me Texas is fortunate in being able to call on one who is already qualified.

Congressman Johnson has had eleven years' service in the House of Representatives, although he is now only thirty-nine years of age. In these eleven years his record for accomplishment is outstanding; his ability to get things done will be testified to by anyone who has ever had any dealings with his office. He holds membership on the important Armed Services Committee and the Atomic Energy Committee. He is given credit for having brought about our present 70-group Air Force, and in preventing the sale or dismantling of our war-time plants. He knows the problems of the farmer -- he was reared on a farm and has consistently worked for soil conservation, rural electrification, flood control and farm roads. He knows the problems of the veteran -- he is one, having served in the South Pacific. He believes in free enterprise for all, that the employer and the wage-earner are entitled to benefit according to their labors. He has worked for low-cost housing and to halt the spiral of inflation.

I am confident if you knew Congressman Johnson as I do -- as a patriotic and courageous Texan -- you would be enthusiastic in casting your vote, with mine, for his election as United States Senator.

It is time for some straight thinking on whether Coke Stevenson or Lyndon Johnson will represent Texas in the United States Senate.

For the past 11 years, Mr. Johnson has been a member of the Congress, representing the Austin district. He has been the very essence of New Dealism and a stalwart of the philosophy of government which has brought this Nation to the brink of disaster. During all these years, he sat close to the thrones of those who determined our national and international policies. He sat on several very important committees considering matters concerned with the national welfare, including the Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy. He helped sow the seed for the harvest we now are reaping. He was very effective in getting government contracts and other special favors for his friends.

Mr. Johnson cannot escape his share of the responsibility for the condition in which we find ourselves because he, by his own admission, had an important part in shaping the course of events which now rise up to plague us. Some of the most tragic chapters in American history now are coming to light. For the past 14 years, Coke Stevenson has occupied a position of prominence in the affairs of our State government. If you will recall the events of these years, you will find Coke Stevenson always has been on the side of sound, solid, conservative and truly progressive government. He assisted materially in stamping out the influence of the "parlor pink" in Texas. Wherever possible the fellow travelers who had attached themselves to State government have been eliminated and notice was served that activities aimed at undermining the American form of government would not be tolerated.

Coke Stevenson has not permitted himself to be used as the willing tool of any group, clique or selfish interest seeking personal profit for themselves or their friends from their government. His record is one of solid achievement in the best of American traditions.

An effort is being made to smear Mr. Stevenson as a result of the endorsement made by the Texas Federation of Labor. Mr. Stevenson has publicly stated that this endorsement was not solicited by him. The facts are that it was actively sought by Mr. Johnson whose campaign workers had a suite of hotel rooms at Fort Worth during the AFL convention and were openly asking and coveting this support.

Mr. Stevenson has stated he made no trade or agreement with union labor leaders then, has made none since and will not make any trade or agreement with any special interest group. This is entirely in keeping with his record of performance in the past.

Attached is a copy of a "blacklist" published by the CIO after passage of the Taft-Hartley Act. You will note that it contains the name of every Texas Congressman who voted for the Taft-Hartley law with one notable exception. That exception is Congressman Johnson.

It is significant that Lyndon Johnson carried every CIO box and led in every CIO County in the State in the first primary.

Can it be that Mr. Johnson has an "understanding" with the CIO, especially since one vote, more or less, could not determine the outcome of House action on this bill? Can it be that the CIO would like to have him in the Senate where every vote counted? Can the leopard change his spots?

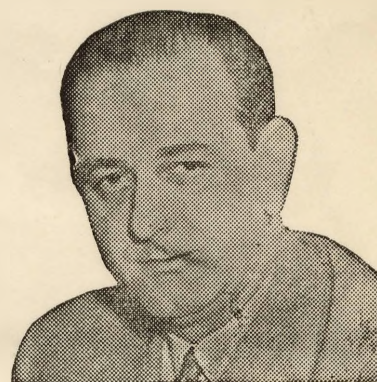

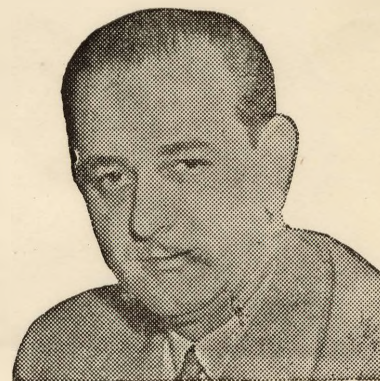
