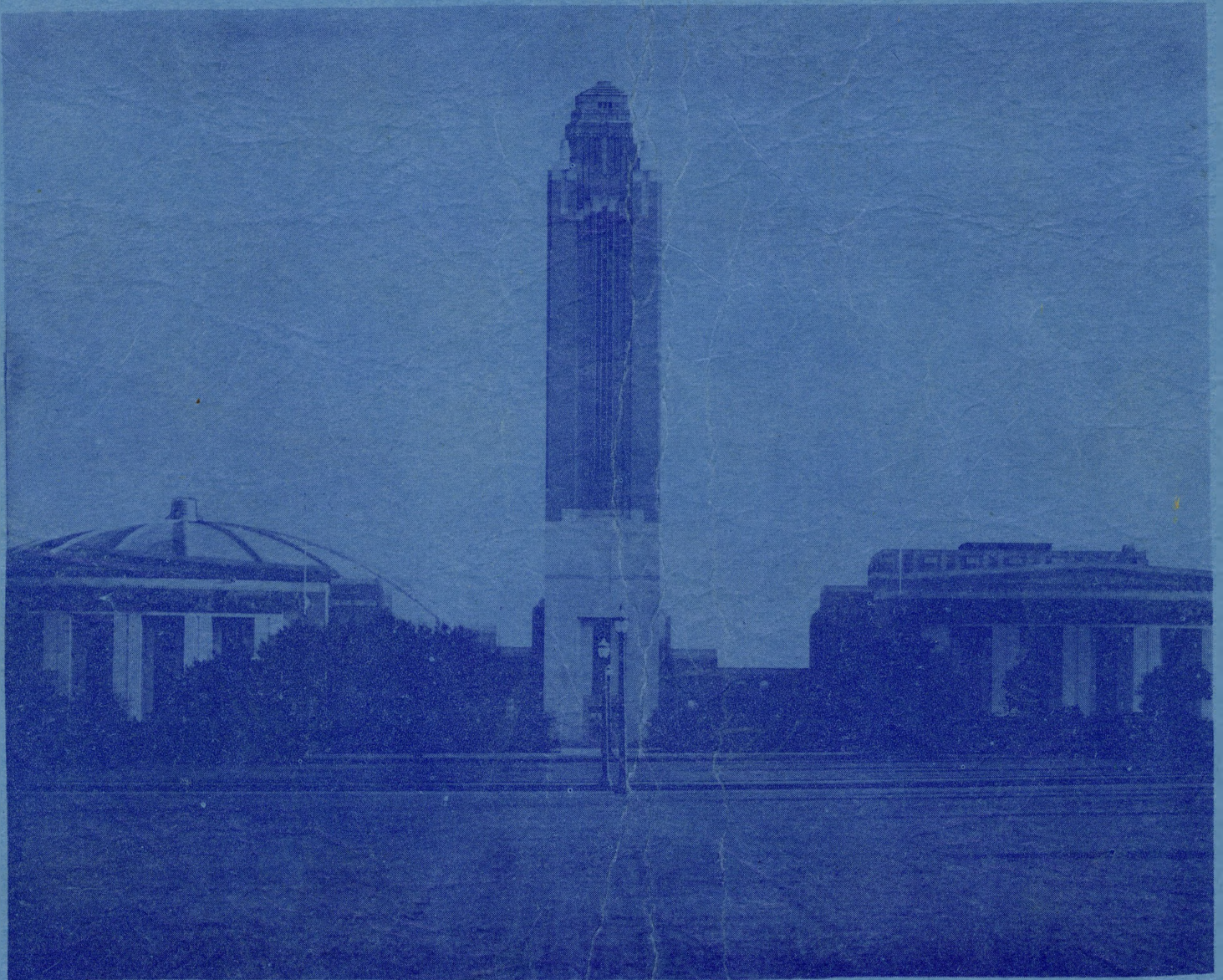

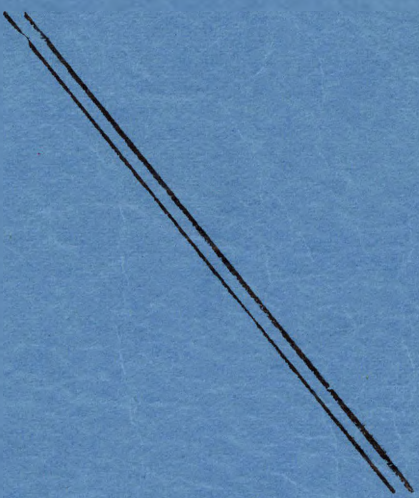

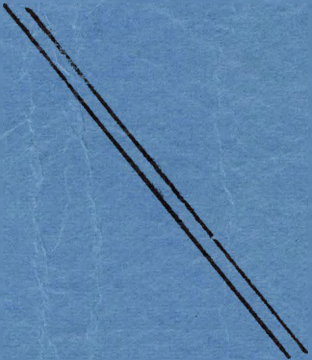

State Flag, Seal, Flower, Motto, Song; Other Designations

STATE FLAG.—The officially adopted flag of the state is the "Lone Star Flag" of the former Republic of Texas. The Texas state flag is the only flag of an American commonwealth that was originally the flag of a recognized independent country. The flag consists of a blue field with a single large star and white and red horizontal stripes, with the white stripe uppermost.

The flag of Texas was adopted by the Third Congress of the Republic in session at Houston Jan. 25, 1839. It specified that the flag should consist of "a blue perpendicular stripe of the width of one third of the whole length of the flag and a white star of five points in the center thereof and two horizontal stripes of equal length and breadth, the upper stripe of white, the lower of red, of the length of two thirds of the length of the whole flag." This is today the Lone Star Flag of Texas. There was no other specification of the Flag of Texas until a statute was passed by the Forty-Third Legislature (Acts of 1933, p. 186, ch. 87), clarifying, but not changing, the original description given above. The statute, however, added specifications, one being that the star, from topmost to lowest points, shall be approximately one third of the depth of the blue field.

STATE SOBRIQUET.—Texas is known as the Lone Star State, a designation derived from the single star in the flag of the state and of the former Republic of Texas.

STATE CITIZENSHIP DESIGNATION.—The people of Texas usually call themselves **Texans**. However, the designation, **Texian**, was generally used in the early period of history, and it is still used in some degree, notably in historical articles. There was a public controversy over the issue at the time of the transition from general use of "Texian" to that of "Texan."

STATE SONG.—The state song of Texas is "Texas, Our Texas," the music of which was written by William J. Marsh, Fort Worth, Texas, and the words by Mr. Marsh and Gladys Yoakum Wright, also of Fort Worth. It was adopted as the result of an award offered by the Legislature. (Acts of 1929, first called session, Forty-First Legislature.)

STATE MOTTO.—The state motto of Texas is "Friendship." The word, Texas, or Tejas, was the Spanish pronunciation of a Caddo Indian word meaning "friends" or "allies." (Acts of 1930, fourth called session of Forty-First Legislature)

*Many flags have flown over Texas with varying degrees of sovereign authority. These flags fall generally into three classifications. First, there are the six sovereign flags—those of Spain, France, Mexico, the Republic of Texas, the Southern Confederacy and the United States. These are the six flags frequently mentioned in Texas history. (See p. 90.) Second, there was the large number of flags flown by various military units during the Texas Revolution and during the early days of the Republic, prior to adoption of the Lone Star Flag as the official standard in 1839. Two or three of these flags received a degree of government recognition, but most of them were merely company or regimental flags. Among these were the flags flown at the Alamo, Gonzales, Goliad and San Jacinto. Third, there were the flags of the turbulent period of 1811-1821, when several attempts were made to free Texas from the Spanish yoke, following the failure of the Hidalgo revolt in Mexico. For an account of these flags, see the Texas Almanac, 1945-1946, pp. 84-86. For a detailed account, the reader is referred to the book, "Romantic Flags of Texas," by Mamie Wynne Cox, Dallas, Texas.

STATE SEAL.—The seal of the State of Texas consists of "a star of five points, encircled by olive and live oak branches, and the words 'The State of Texas.'" (State Consti-



tution, Art. IV, Sec. 19.) The state seal is a slight modification of the Great Seal of the Republic of Texas adopted by the Congress of the Republic Dec. 10, 1836, and readopted with modifications in 1839. It is said that, when the need of a seal arose, Provisional Governor Henry Smith made the imprint with a large brass button cut from his overcoat, the button having a five-point star and wreath of oak leaves. Later the olive branch was added to signify "peace" as well as "strength."

STATE TREE.—The pecan is the state tree of Texas. It has long been the most popular of Texas trees, but the sentiment that led to its official adoption probably grew out of the request of Gov. James Stephen Hogg that a pecan tree be planted at his grave. (Acts of 1919, Thirty-Sixth Legislature, regular session.)

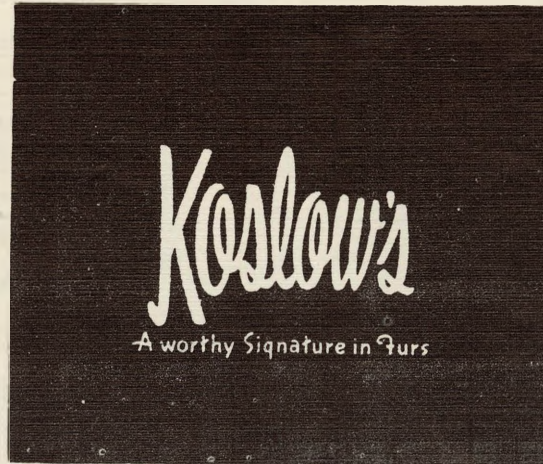
STATE FLOWER.—The state flower of Texas is the bluebonnet, also called buffalo clover, wolf flower, "el conejo" (the rabbit). Scientifically, it is *Lupinus texensis*. *Lupinus subcarneus* is closely related and is accepted also as the state flower in those parts of the state where it grows. It was adopted by the State Legislature at the request of the Society of Colonial Dames of America in Texas. (Acts of 1901, regular session of Twenty-Seventh Legislature.)

STATE FLOWER SONG.—In addition to the state song given above, there is a state flower song of Texas, "Bluebonnets." Words are by Julia D. Booth and music by Lora C. Crockett. (Acts of 1933, Forty-Third Legislature, regular session.) This is not to be considered as a second state song but as a song honoring the state flower.

STATE BIRD.—The mockingbird is the officially recognized state bird of Texas, adopted by the Legislature at the request of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. (Acts of 1927, Fortieth Legislature, regular session.)

STATE HOLIDAYS.—Texas has two state holidays and several special observance days. The two holidays are Independence Day, March 2, and San Jacinto Day, April 21.

Political Calendar

Sept. 14.—(First Tuesday after third Monday after fourth Saturday in August.) At 10 a.m. state convention meets at place previously selected by state executive committee, declares party nominees, and adopts party platform (R.S. Art. 3136). (R.S. Art. 3139 as amended states "second Monday" but in this conflict the state executive committee has followed Article 3136.)

Oct. 2.—Secretary of State prescribes forms thirty days prior to general election—Nov. 2 in 1948 (R.S. Art. 2925).

Oct. 2.—Governor, not less than thirty days before general election, issues proclamation for notices of election (R.S. Art. 2946).

Oct. 2.—County judge, thirty days before general election, gives notice thereof (R.S. Art. 2950).

Oct. 13.—Absentee voters apply to county clerk to vote not more than twenty, nor less than three, days before general election—Nov. 2 in 1948 (R.S. Art. 2956, subdivision 3).

Oct. 27.—Chairman of county executive committee, not less than five days before general election, nominates supervisors (R.S. Art. 2941).

Oct. 29.—Last day for absentee voting in general election (R.S. Art. 2956, subdivision 3).

Nov. 1.—Last day for sheriff to deliver writs of election, etc. (R.S. Art. 2948).

Nov. 2.—(First Tuesday after first Monday in November.) At 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., general election (R.S. Art. 2930);

Nov. 8.—(Monday following general election.) Earliest date commissioners court can canvass returns of election (R.S. Art. 3030).

Nov. 12.—(Within ten days after general election.) Last day for candidates and campaign managers to file final statement of campaign expense (R.S. Art. 3144).

Nov. 17.—Fifteenth day after election, day of election excluded, and not before, Secretary of State, in presence of Governor and Attorney General, opens and counts returns of election (R.S. Art. 3034).

To Fort Worthers, Will Rogers and "Soapsuds" will always remain among us, because of the beautiful bronze statue which stands in front of the Memorial Coliseum, Tower and Auditorium, named in his honor, and the portrait which hangs inside the Coliseum entrance Hall.

It was on November 4, 1947, in the presence of thousands, that General Dwight D. Eisenhower unveiled the statue and portrait, as the gift to the citizens of Fort Worth, of Mr. Amon G. Carter, life long intimate friend of the great humorist.

The bronze statue which stands 9 feet, 11 inches high and weighing 3,200 pounds, was executed by Electra Waggoner of Vernon and Fort Worth, the daughter of a pioneer Texas family. It was completed in 1939, and depicts the humorist astride his favorite horse "Soapsuds" riding into the sunset, in the city he so often called "home."

The canvas, 12 feet wide and 16 feet high, a life-sized portrait of Will Rogers astride his horse, was painted by Mr. Seymour M. Stone of New York and Fort Worth.

Standing in the presence of either the statue or the canvas, so like the man himself, one cannot help but be proud to be a citizen of the city he loved so well, as Will Rogers missed no opportunity to visit Fort Worth. His own brand of humor, his philosophy of living, and his rare common sense will always live in the heart of every true AMERICAN.

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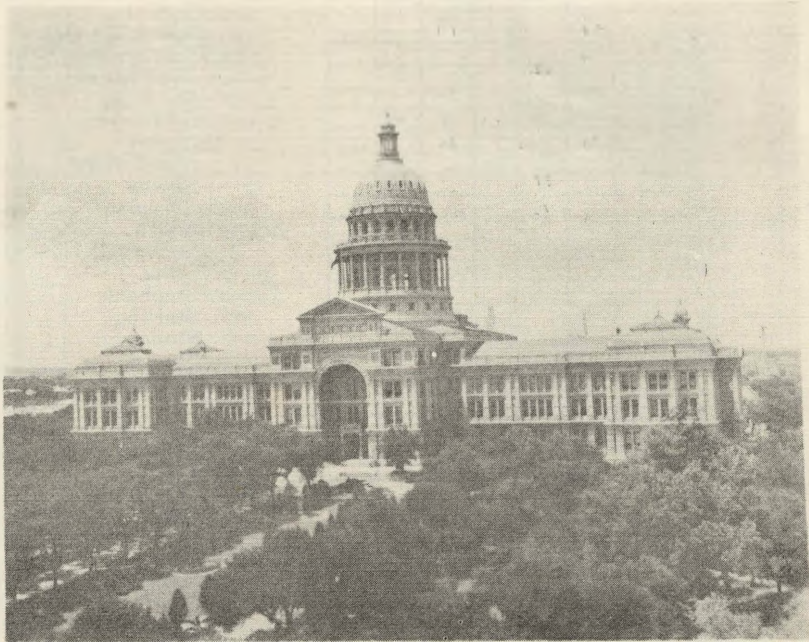

Texas Capitol Building, Austin, Texas

Construction work was begun February 1, 1882, and the building was dedicated May 16, 1888. It was built at a cost of 3,000,000 acres of land of the State taken from the public domain. Architect — E. E. Myers, Contractor — Abner Taylor. The exterior walls were built with more than fifteen thousand carloads of red granite, hauled 75 miles from the inexhaustible quarries of Burnet County. The wainscoting is made of oak, pine, cherry, cedar, walnut, ash and mahogany. The building proper covers three acres of ground and has about 18 acres of floor space.

The Capitol is shaped like a Greek cross, fronting south, with projecting center and flanks, having a rotunda and dome at the intersection of the main corridors. There are 392 rooms, 18 vaults, 924 windows and 404 doors. Length, including porticoes, 528 feet. Height, 311 feet from grade line to top of statue on dome — seven feet taller than dome of National Capitol. It is second in size only to our National Capitol, and at the time of construction was said to be the seventh largest building in the world.

History tells us that when an occasion arose for the need of a seal, Provisional Governor Henry Smith cut a brass button from his overcoat and made the necessary imprint. This button had a five-point star and wreath of oak leaves on it, hence the origin of our present-day Texas seal, with modifications.



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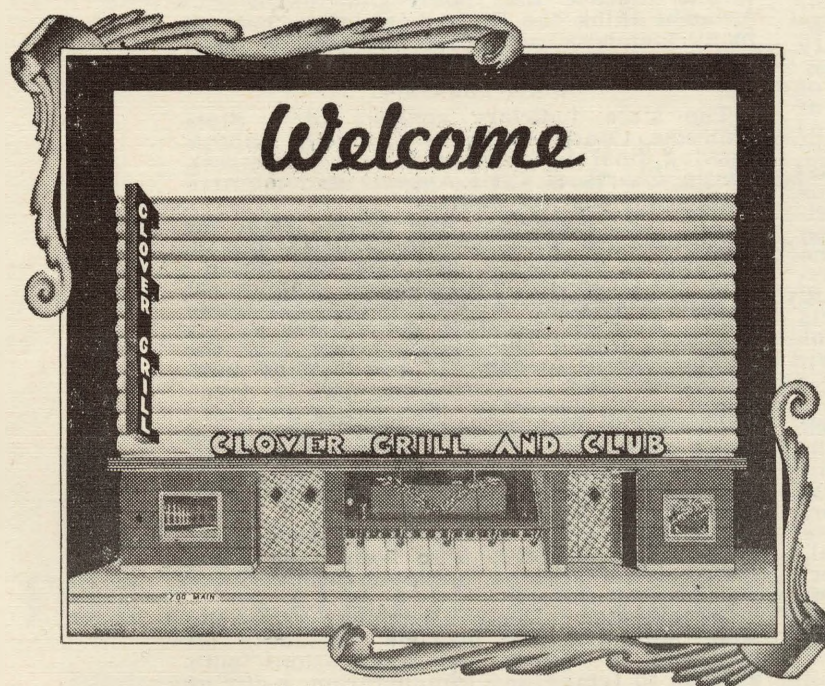

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State Government of Texas—Officials

In the character of its constitution and the structure of its administrative, legislative and judicial branches, the State Government of Texas is after the general pattern of the Federal Government and the other forty-seven American commonwealths. A few characteristics are derived from the fact that it once had the status of a sovereign state among the world's nations. The prominence that is given the constitutionally provided office of Secretary of State is one. The important General Land Office headed by its Land Commissioner is another. This office, which came into existence under the Republic of Texas and was logically continued after annexation because Texas retained for itself all of its public domain under the annexation agreement, is unique among the forty-eight state governments.

In the Constitution and statutes of Texas are also some vestiges of the Spanish sovereignty that preceded the era of the Republic. Noteworthy is the community property provision for property ownership by husband and wife which is adhered to in varying form by Texas and by eight other southwestern and western states.

The present State Constitution of Texas was adopted in 1876.

preceded by account of preceding six constitutions adopted under Spanish rule and under the Republic, the Confederacy and statehood before and after the War Between the States.

The chief executive is the Governor serving a two-year term with the usual duties and functions of the governors of the American states, but with somewhat less than average authority in relation to both the legislative and the judicial branches of government and also with relation to the other offices in the administrative branch. In addition to the Governor, ten of the state's top administrative officers, including the three members of the Railroad Commission, are elective. The Governor has wide appointive power, subject to advice and consent of the Senate in most instances, in the administrative branch outside these positions, but there is little machinery for co-ordinating the executive offices under an executive policy. The Governor appoints none of the state judiciary except for interim tenure. He has the customary veto power which can be overridden by two-thirds vote. As a rule the Legislature of Texas acts with greater independence of gubernatorial suggestion than in federal or other state governments. This arises partly from the lack of political need of co-ordination in a one-party state. The limitations placed upon the Governor of Texas are primarily the result of the fears of oppression by executive power that were instilled in the Texan mind during the era of Mexican sovereignty and the carpet-bag rule immediately after the War Between the States. To this same cause may be attributed the great length and the many purely statutory provisions found in the State Constitution.

Administrative System.

The executive and administrative branch of the Texas State Government is a complicated one, consisting of more than 100 individual official positions, boards and commissions. At the head stands the Governor, elected for a two-year term. Elective also are the Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of Agriculture, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Commissioner of the General Land Office and the three members of the Railroad Commission. All elective tenures are for two years except the Railroad Commission, a three-member body with six-year, overlapping terms. The Secretary of State is an originally established (under the Republic) constitutional position, and is ap-

pointive. Nearly all of the other numerous officials, boards and commissions are appointed by the Governor, usually but not always "with the advice and consent of the Senate." In some instances, important positions are filled by the appointive commissions, notably the State Highway Engineer, who is appointed by the State Highway Commission.

On the whole, the system is a heterogeneous assembly of governmental devices. It has developed primarily because of the too-inclusive State Constitution, which is about five times as long as the Federal Constitution. It was adopted in 1876 under the hangover influence of the Reconstruction and carpet-bag rule.

Authors of the document felt a necessity for writing all government into the Constitution as a guarantee of individual rights. Numerous amendments have complicated rather than simplified both the Constitution and the framework of statutory law and governmental functions that rest upon it. Today the State Government of Texas is anything but "streamlined" in form or action. However, it has performed efficiently, considering handicaps, and has been remarkably free of corruption. It has been and is today a thoroughly democratic government, responsive to the will of the people. No political machine has ever become entrenched. Until recent years, the Texas State Government operated economically, and the rapid increase in expenditures in recent years has been primarily for education, highways and pensions.

Legislature.

The Legislature consists of a Senate of 31 members, elected for four-year terms, and a House of Representatives which may not exceed 150 members, elected for two-year terms. It now consists of 150 members from 127 districts. Legislature meets in regular biennial session on the second Tuesday in January in odd-numbered years.

Special sessions are called at the will of the Governor. Despite an amendment in 1930 increasing the regular session with full salary of \$10 a day from 60 to 120 days, business is seldom finished in the allotted time. Many students of government think the State Legislature has too many members, and there has been a movement for reduction in its size.

State Judiciary.

The state judiciary consists of a State Supreme Court, Court of Criminal Appeals (having final jurisdiction in criminal cases), eleven Courts of Civil Appeals and approximately 130 district courts.

In somewhat less degree than the administrative branch, the judicial branch has run to patchwork, and this was measurably remedied by constitutional amendment in 1945, converting the three-member Supreme Court, with its assisting commission of six members, into a nine-justice bench. Like the administrative system, it has always been singularly free of corruption, and is democratic in its operation. The entire judiciary of Texas is elective except the commission which assists the Court of Criminal Appeals. District judges are elected for four years; the appellate courts are three-member benches, with six-year terms.

The State Board of Control of three members is the budget-making body. The fiscal system is complicated, operated through more than 100 state funds.

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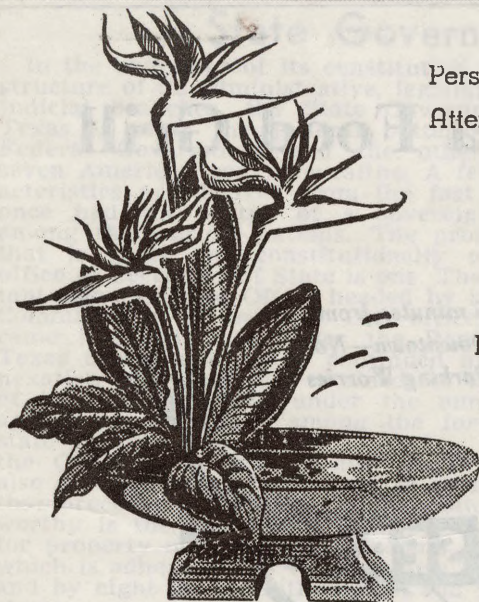
